Founded in 2013, Bronzeville Arts Ensemble (BAE) is a professional theatre company committed to the expansion and cultivation of Milwaukee's African American theatre community. BAE illuminates the Black experience in America by developing and creating theatre while also providing artistic and educational programming opportunities, collaborating with the local and national community, and inspiring healing through positive social change.

The 2023 - 2024 Theatre Season marks the tenth anniversary of Bronzeville Arts Ensemble! Ten years ago, I joined six African American professional theatre artists in creating a company which we agreed would illuminate the Black experience in America! Let us celebrate the founders of Bronzeville Arts Ensemble: Allen Edge, Azeeza Islam, Bill Jackson, Chike Johnson, Malkia Stampley Johnson, Marvette Knight, Don E. Pannell, and Sheri Williams Pannell.

For ten years Bronzeville Arts Ensemble has remained true to our mission by offering playwrighting workshops for adults, new play readings, collaborations with theatre companies locally and nationally, producing original work by local playwrights, and participating as a founding company of the Milwaukee Black Theatre Festival which is in its fifth year and under the direction of Black Arts MKE!

In 2023 Bronzeville Arts Ensemble aka BAE with Black Arts MKE participated in World Premiers Wisconsin with an original musical, *Zuri's Crown* by Cynthia Cobb, Parrish Collier and Sheri Williams Pannell. This was a humorous hair-story which sisters of all backgrounds could relate. Articles about the musical were published locally and nationally, including in the electronic edition of EBONY Magazine.

BAE produced a reading of Jeff Stetson's play *The Meeting* and followed up with a coproduction with Black Arts MKE for the Milwaukee Black Theatre Festival during the summer of 2023.

For our tenth anniversary year, we are proud to announce we are in residence at the Martin Luther King Community Center on 15th and Vliet Street in Milwaukee, Wisconsin and continue as an affiliate of Black Arts MKE. Our Tenth Anniversary Season productions include:

#Enough, an national theatre event with readings of anti-gun violence plays by youth from across country. The performance was offered free to the community on November 6, 2023. The cast featured Tony Austin, Selena McKnight, Leonardt Horàk, Jeannine Rivers-Colbourn, and the percussion troupe Drums Up, Guns Down.

Words Seldom Heard, the Lesser-Known Speeches of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was a collaboration with King Community Center in celebration of the King Holiday on Monday, January 15, 2024. The Milwaukee community celebrated Dr. King with spoken word, music, and honoring local sheroes.

February 2024, Bronzeville Arts Ensemble celebrates Black History Month by producing a new work by La'Ketta Caldwell, *Khloe's Beautiful Blues*. The memory play punctuated with poetry and song, tells the story of a woman who recalls the kindness of a mentor who helped her thrive despite bullying received by classmates because of her dark skin.

We will end our Tenth Anniversary Season with a special celebration whose details are soon to come!

Synopsis: Khloe's Beautiful Blues

Khloe's Beautiful Blues is a one-act play which takes audiences on a poignant and inspiring journey of self-discovery, resilience, and the healing power of music. Through Khloe's story, we are reminded of the importance of embracing one's identity, confronting adversity with courage, and finding strength in the support of mentors and community.

Scene 1: Reflections of Childhood Torment

The one-act play opens with Khloe, a successful adult, haunted by the memories of her childhood taunts and bullying. Despite her achievements, the scars of her past threaten to overshadow her present. Through her soliloquy, the audience witnesses the names she was called and the pain she endured during her school days.

Scene 2: Finding Solace and Encountering Mr. Clark

In a classroom setting, Khloe faces continued torment from her peers, with the teacher failing to intervene effectively. Outside the classroom, Khloe discovers solace through poetry and music, where she encounters Mr. Clark, her music teacher. Despite initial resistance, Khloe begins to realize that Mr. Clark might be the mentor she desperately needs.

Scene 3: Embracing the Blues and Self-Discovery

As Khloe navigates her tumultuous emotions, Mr. Clark introduces her to the Blues, a transformative experience that connects her to her ancestors' struggles and resilience. Through writing assignments and musical exploration, Khloe begins to find her voice and identity, shedding light on the power of self-expression and acceptance.

Scene 4: Triumph and Transformation

Despite facing additional challenges at school and home, Khloe finds strength and support in Mr. Clark, who becomes a father figure and mentor. Together, they confront adversity, heal past wounds, and celebrate moments of triumph, including Khloe's powerful rendition of the National Black Anthem at a talent showcase.

Scene 5: Gratitude and New Beginnings

As Khloe receives her college acceptance letter, she reflects on her journey of self-discovery and the profound impact Mr. Clark has had on her life. With newfound courage and resilience, Khloe embraces her future with hope and gratitude, symbolizing the transformative power of mentorship, resilience, and the Blues.

Writing Blues Lyrics

A connection to literacy in the General Music Classroom By Natalie Wilson* General Music/Vocal Jazz Chair, Ages 6-12 - Jazz Education Network

With a little understanding of the 12-bar blues form, all students K-8 are capable of writing blues lyrics. Along the lines of poetry, blues lyrics are written with rhyming words and rhythm.

The process:

- 1. Give a background of the 12-bar blues form, indicating three lines of equal length.
- 2. Lyrics require three (3) lines only, that need to fill the space of the musical form. The lyrics may be short, however there will be many 'rests' to fill the time.
- 3. Begin with two rhyming words i.e. "frog" and "log"
- 4. Write simple sentences. The first two lines may repeat.

I saw a frog. I saw a frog. It sat on a log.

5. Embellish the lyrics. Add descriptors to the lines for length in the musical phrase. When? Where? How? What did it look like? Make sure the rhyming word still is at the end of the phrase.

I was walking on a trail and I saw a little green frog. I said...
I was walking on a trail and I saw a cute, little green frog.
It was hard to find because it sat on a really big log.

- 6. Play with more sets of rhyming words.
- 7. Speak the words in time while playing the 12-bar blues form. Each lyrical line must begin with the matching musical line. Note how the longer the lyric is, the easier it is to place within the rhythm of the musical line.
- 8. Create/improvise a melody to the lyric over the 12-bar blues form.
- 9. Perform the lyrics with 12-bar blues accompaniment.
- 10. Write additional verses to create a musical story and/or incorporate into other musical forms.

Impacts of Bullying

Children who are bullied can experience negative physical, social, emotional, academic, and mental health issues, says stop bullying.org. They also shared that media reports often link bullying with suicide, and a small number of bullied children might retaliate through extremely violent measures.

The experience of being bullied can cause lasting emotional damage to victims and shape them as adults. Physical wounds heal, but the lasting impact of words damages the ability to view yourself as a desirable, capable, and effective human being.
